Lenz

Lent is a season of penitence and preparation, traditionally marked by an emphasis on prayer and fasting. Originally a time of preparation for baptism for new Christians, its value was soon recognized by the whole church.

During Lent we remember Jesus' forty days of preparation in the wilderness; and we enter into the mystery of Christ's suffering and death, before the glorious victory of Easter.

In keeping with the reflective mood of the season, the church is stripped of flowers and the hangings are in sombre purple.

This penitential tone is apparent in the prayers and readings. In particular we pray Kyrie Eleison, "Lord, have mercy" (or "Lord, you are merciful") – a prayer which is simultaneously a petition and thanksgiving; an acknowledgment of what God has done, is doing, and will continue to do.



We start this service by greeting one another in God's name; we 'clear the decks' by receiving God's forgiveness for our sins, and those of the world; we acknowledge God's mercy as we sing the *Kyrie Eleison*; and we pray the Collect (prayer for the week) which gathers up our thoughts and prayers.

¶ Listening & Responding to God

We listen to readings from the Old Testament (the ancient Jewish Bible that Jesus himself knew) and/or the New Testament (writings of the early Christians), and from one of the Gospels – accounts of the life and teachings of Jesus.

Through the sermon we explore what these readings mean, and what God might be saying to us through them today.

We respond by affirming the faith we share, as we say the Creed, and by praying for the needs of the world.



We stand

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.

We remember Jesus' instruction not to bring gifts to God if we have anything against our brothers or sisters. So we share God's peace with one another before our offerings are brought forward – bread and wine, symbols of human labour, and the money we offer for the church's work.

Those onsite may then gather at the altar (holy table) to pray the Eucharistic Prayer.

In this great prayer of thanksgiving, we give thanks for all that God has done for us, especially through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. We remember Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples. And we pray that, by the Holy Spirit, Jesus may be present to us in the bread and wine, and nourish us with his divine life.

The Peace



On the first four Sundays of Lent

It is indeed right and good to give you thanks and praise, almighty God and everlasting Father, through Jesus Christ your Son.

For in these forty days you lead us into the desert of repentance that through a pilgrimage of prayer and discipline we may grow in grace and learn to be your people once again.

Through fasting, prayer and acts of service you bring us back to your generous heart.

Through study of your holy word you open our eyes to your presence in the world and free our hands to welcome others into the radiant splendour of your love.

As we prepare to celebrate the Easter feast with joyful hearts and minds we bless you for your mercy and join with saints and angels for ever praising you and singing:

On the Fifth Sunday in Lent (Passion Sunday)

It is indeed right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

For as the time of his passion and resurrection draws near the whole world is called to acknowledge his hidden majesty.

The power of the life-giving cross reveals the judgement that has come upon the world and the triumph of Christ crucified.

He is the victim who dies no more, the Lamb once slain, who lives for ever, our advocate in heaven to plead our cause, exalting us there to join with angels and archangels, for ever praising you and singing:

Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of thanks and praise, and as we eat and drink these holy gifts in the presence of your divine majesty, renew us by your Spirit, inspire us with your love and unite us in the body of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

You are worthy of our thanks and praise, Lord God of truth, for by the breath of your mouth you have spoken your word, and all things have come into being.

You fashioned us in your image and placed us in the garden of your delight. Though we chose the path of rebellion you would not abandon your own.

Again and again you drew us into your covenant of grace. You gave your people the law and taught us by your prophets to look for your reign of justice, mercy and peace.

As we watch for the signs of your kingdom on earth, we echo the song of the angels in heaven, evermore praising you and singing:

Therefore we proclaim the death that he suffered on the cross, we celebrate his resurrection, his bursting from the tomb, we rejoice that he reigns at your right hand on high and we long for his coming in glory.

Look with favour on your people and in your mercy hear the cry of our hearts. Bless the earth, heal the sick, let the oppressed go free and fill your Church with power from on high.

Gather your people from the ends of the earth to feast with [N and] all your saints at the table in your kingdom, where the new creation is brought to perfection in Jesus Christ our Lord;

by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

Draw near with faith.

Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you, and his blood which he shed for you.

Eat and drink in remembrance that he died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

Or

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

All Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

Prayer of Humble Access

This prayer may be said

ΑII We do not presume to come to this your table, merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in your manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under your table. But you are the same Lord whose nature is always to have mercy. Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ and to drink his blood, that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his body and our souls washed through his most precious blood, and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Amen.

Sharing of Communion

If you are onsite

You are invited to come forward to the altar to receive the bread and wine (if you would do so in any Christian church), or else to receive a blessing.

If you wish to receive a blessing, please keep your hands lowered.

If you are joining in online

You may wish to pray this Act of Spiritual Reception

Thanks be to you, Lord Jesus Christ, for all the benefits you have given me, for all the pains and insults you have borne for me.

Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally,
I ask you to come spiritually into my heart.

O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know you more clearly, love you more dearly, and follow you more nearly, day by day.


